I think it is fair to say that drop-off and collection are much improved after the recent changes in timings. However, as we work together to keep our school community safe and running smoothly, I would like to remind everyone of the importance of following car parking guidelines and ensuring timely arrival each morning. Adhering to these rules not only keeps our drop-off area safe but also sets our pupils up for a positive, productive day. Our parking lot can be busy, especially during morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up. To ensure the safety of all pupils, please remember to follow these guidelines:

- Please drop off only in the designated areas (near the front entrance or along the pedestrian walkway). This reduces congestion and ensures that children are entering the building from safe areas.
- Speed limits and signs are posted to keep everyone safe. Following these rules ensures a smooth and safe flow of traffic.
- Double parking can obstruct visibility and slow down traffic, increasing the risk of accidents.
- Reminder: ALL 6th formers who drive to school need to ask permission and register their cars with Juliet, the school secretary.

Arriving on time sets the tone for a successful day. Our school registers are legal documents and it is essential that all pupils are sitting at their desks in their form rooms by 8.30. Being a few minutes late may seem minor, but it can disrupt both the pupil's day and that of the class. A timely start ensures that everyone is ready and focused for a full day of learning- thank you!

Senior School News! Paland TRIP

Senior school pupils visited Krakow last week and enjoyed the delights of an ancient and beautiful city, as well as encountering more sobering visits to places of historical interest at Auschwitz.

The beautiful ancient city of Krakow with its craft and art shops, its china and chocolate specialties were immediately attractive to all as were its restaurants and boutiques all readily stocked for the Christmas markets. The horse drawn carriages trotting by and the bells of churches gave the city a magical quality only surpassed by its twinkling lights. We visited Oscar Schindler's factory, now a compelling museum of how the Polish nation was impacted by World War II. Our visit was followed by a meeting with the daughter of a local resident whose own mother saved a Jewish school friend of hers from the ghetto and death camps. There was a tour of the local Jewish quarter, including a visit to the Remu Synagogue and cemetery, and an evening meal in a Jewish restaurant with traditional folk music. The next day's visit to Auschwitz concentration camp, and Auschwitz-Birkenau Death Camp were sobering and solemn reminders of the terrible inhumanities that are too often inflicted by ideologically driven people whose power and forces, coerce individuals to permit and commit such terrifying atrocities. The trip also included a meal at the Hard Rock Café in the city centre and the final day's visit included a tour of the "Wieliczka" Salt Mine. We descended over 60 metres deep into the rock and trekked over two km, exploring only 1% of the actual mines, to see ancient workings, carved statues of Polish dignitaries such a Copernicus, and Pope John Paul II, alongside spectacular chapels fashioned in the mine's cavernous underground hollows.
