

All this great physical activity is in line with the studies carried out by Arnold Gesell the child development theorist who is known for his work on physical development. Gesell's theory of physical development is based on the idea that growth occurs in cycles, with each cycle taking about six stages, or half a year. He observed many children and created age-norms for physical development, which we use in Pre-School to understand, support and promote every child's physical development.

Year Five Science Last Week

In science year 5 have been looking at reversible and irreversible changes. On Wednesday 16th October we conducted an experiment using a balloon, vinegar and bicarbonate of soda. The children were thrilled when the chemical reaction inflated their balloons. We learnt that the chemical reaction used the original materials to create a new one – carbon dioxide. This is the product that caused the balloons to inflate. It was very exciting, and the children were sad to see their balloons go into the bin.








Remembering Lily Ebert







